What is a Title I?

Title I serves to ensure that all children have a fair, equal, and significant opportunity to obtain a high-quality education and reach, at a minimum, proficiency on challenging state academic achievement standards and state academic assessments.



What does it mean to be a Title I School?

- Being a Title I school means receiving federal funding (Title I dollars) to <u>supplement</u> the school's existing programs. These dollars are used for...
 - ✓ Identifying students experiencing academic difficulties and providing timely assistance to help these student's meet the State's challenging content standards.
 - ✓ Purchasing supplemental staff, programs, materials and supplies
 - Conducting parent and family engagement meetings, trainings and activities
 - ✓ Recruiting/Hiring/Retaining Professional Qualified Teachers
- Being a Title I school also means parent engagement is needed and required











K - 3rd Grade EOY Reading DIBELS Data

- In accordance with the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) of 2015, all Local Education Agency schools are required to provide timely notification to parents when students have been taught by a teacher does not meet the professional qualifications and is in their child's classroom for more than 20 consecutive days.
- The Professional Qualification notification letter is send home to parents via US mail regarding their child's teacher not meeting the requirements for Professional Qualifications.
